# FAQ's For Holiday Wine Gifting

## What is the average price range for holiday gifts?

According to Forbes and Wine.com, the average price range for holiday wine gifts could be anywhere from \$20 to \$100 per bottle. The average gift in general is \$50 - \$100 for family members and \$20-\$50 for a friend. Average \$15- \$40 bottle of wine to take to a party.

The important thing is to choose a gift that you think the recipient will enjoy and appreciate

## What are some good wines to give as gifts?

Choose wines that are versatile, festive and high quality. For instance, sparkling wines like Champagne, Prosecco, Cava, for celebrating. Red wines like Cabernet Sauvignon, Zinfandel and Pinot Noir for pairing with hearty dishes; white wines like Chardonnay, Sauvignon Blanc, and Riesling for refreshing the palate; or dessert wines like Ports and Ice Wine for indulging in sweets.

## Personal touches to wine gifts

You can include a handwritten card or wrap your bottle in a festive bag or paper. Adding a wine accessory is a nice touch like a corkscrew or wineglass. If you're shipping your gift, most wineries are happy to do this for you.

**What is the best wine to serve with ham or turkey?**

Reislings and Rosés. They will accentuate both.



**Should I serve white or red wine with the holiday dinner?**

Both and you should include a rose. There is such a mixture of flavors on the table that you need several wines to take you from start to finish.



**What is a safe wine to bring to someone's house when you're not sure of their taste or what they are serving?**



Barbera. It's a wine that goes with everything on the table.



**What are some good dessert wine options for holiday sweets?**

Ports, Sauternes, Ice Wine or Sparkling wine all pair well.

**How do I calculate how many drinks I'll need for my party?**

- Two drinks for every guest in the first hour
- One drink for every guest every hour after that
- One bottle per guest for a lively four hour party.
- You can use this formula for non-wine drinkers, too, for beer, soda or cocktails.
- Of course you know your crowd and, should recalculate accordingly.

To prep this easy holiday appetizer, remove the phyllo cups from the package and place on a baking sheet.

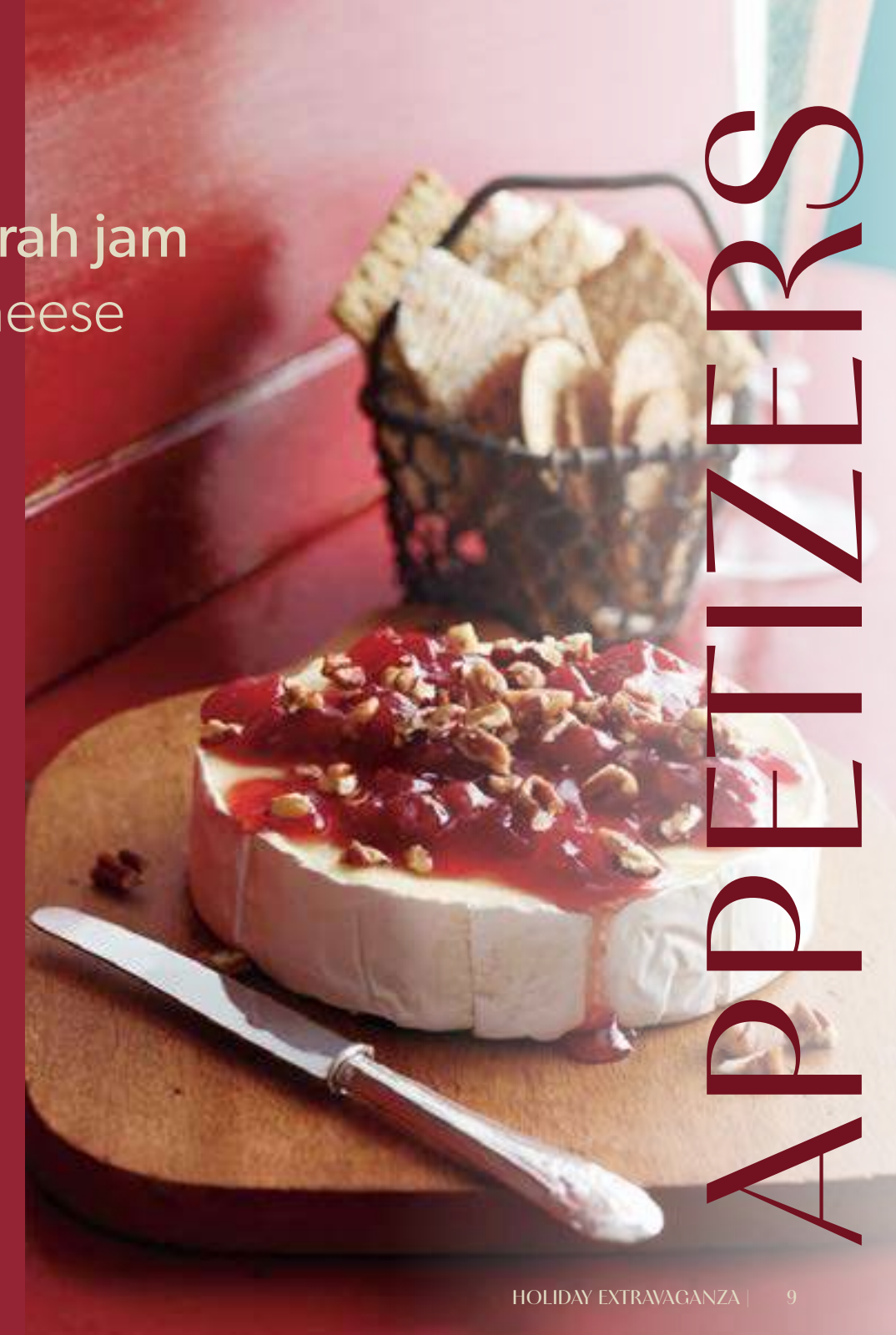
Scoop one teaspoon of goat cheese in each cup and bake at 350 degrees for 3-5 minutes.

# APPETIZERS

## Prosciutto-Wrapped Asparagus

### Ingredients:

Fresh asparagus spears  
Prosciutto slices  
Olive oil

### Instructions:

- Preheat your oven to 400°F (200°C).
- Trim the tough ends of the asparagus spears.
- Take one prosciutto slice and wrap it around an asparagus spear from bottom to top, leaving the tip exposed.
- Repeat this process for the remaining asparagus spears.
- Place the prosciutto-wrapped asparagus on a baking sheet and drizzle with a little olive oil.
- Bake in the preheated oven for about 10-15 minutes or until the prosciutto is crispy and the asparagus is tender.
- Serve hot or at room temperature

## Roller-Skating to Church (Venezuela):

Venezuelans have an unusual way of celebrating Christmas. From the 16th to the 24th of December, locals in the capital, Caracas, strap on their roller skates and glide their way to Christmas Mass, even gliding all the way through the aisle of their church. The tradition is so popular that the government even closes down the streets until 8 a.m. to accommodate the parade. Many people open their homes and offer passing skaters coffee and hot chocolate during the festivities.



## KFC for Christmas Dinner

Ordering Kentucky Fried Chicken for Christmas Dinner is a tradition in Japan. The KFC "Christmas Party Barrels" are so popular that customers need to place their orders weeks in advance.



## Gavlebocken (Sweden):

In Gävle, Sweden, a giant straw goat is erected yearly in the town square at Christmas. The tradition is for locals to try to burn it down, and arson attempts have become an annual occurrence, despite efforts to protect the goat.



## Krampusnacht (Austria and other Alpine countries):



On December 5th, the night before St. Nicholas Day, people dress up as Krampus, a horned, demonic figure, and roam the streets scaring children. It's a unique contrast to the more common jolly St. Nicholas.

## Caga Tió, or the "Pooping Log"



In Catalonia, Spain, there is a character called Caga Tió, Tió de Nadal (Christmas Log) or the "Pooping Log". It is a hollow log with a face and legs that children feed with sweets and nuts until Christmas Eve. Then they hit it with sticks and sing a song to make it poop out presents.

## The Yule Lads (Iceland):



Instead of one Santa Claus, Iceland has 13 Yule Lads who visit children in the 13 nights leading up to Christmas. Each Yule Lad has a distinct personality and leaves either gifts or pranks in shoes left on windowsills.

# How to Travel Cheaply Around the Holidays

- Be flexible with your dates and destinations. You can save money by traveling on less popular days, such as weekdays or Christmas Day, or by choosing alternative airports or locations that are less crowded.
- Use websites and apps that compare prices and offer deals. You can find the best fares and discounts by using tools like Skypicker, Fareness, or Hopper, which help you search for flights, hotels, and car rentals across different platforms.



- Plan ahead and book early. The best time to book a flight is 57 days in advance for domestic flights, and 117 days for international flights<sup>1</sup>. You can also save money by booking your accommodation and activities in advance, and by taking advantage of loyalty programs and rewards cards.
- Pack light and smart. Avoid extra fees and hassles by traveling with carry-on luggage only, or by shipping your gifts ahead of time. You can also pack some essentials like snacks, water, sanitizer, masks, and entertainment to make your trip more comfortable and safe.

While it's summer in Australia during the holiday season, Sydney still goes all out with festive lights, Christmas concerts, and fireworks over the iconic Sydney Harbour.





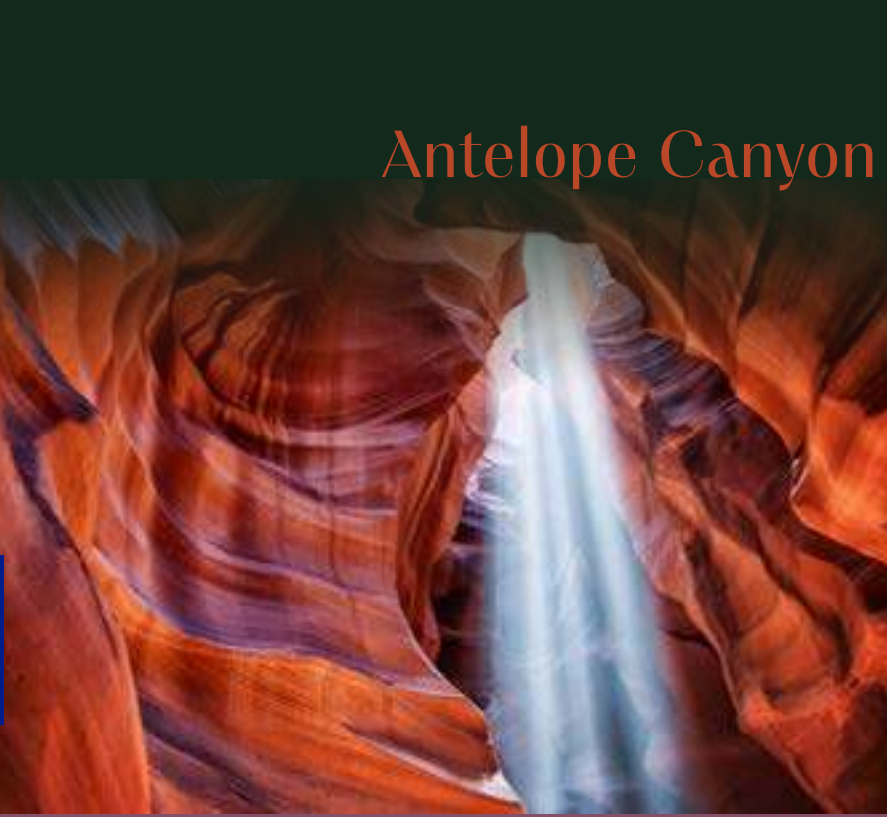
## The Rakotzbrücke Bridge

## Mistletoe Traditions



**In Roman times,** mistletoe represented peace and reconciliation. Enemies would lay down their arms and embrace under the mistletoe.

**In Norse mythology,** mistletoe was the weapon that killed the god Baldur. His mother Frigg, the goddess of love, then declared mistletoe a symbol of love and vowed to kiss anyone who passed under it.

**In medieval England,** mistletoe was hung in houses to ward off evil spirits and bring good luck. A kiss under the mistletoe was also seen as a promise of marriage.

**In ancient Greece,** mistletoe was associated with fertility and the winter festival of Kronia. People may have kissed under it as a way of celebrating life and love.

**In modern times,** kissing under the mistletoe is a popular Christmas tradition that may have originated from the servants in England in the 18th century. It is considered a sign of friendship and goodwill.
